More than three-quarters of UPM North America (NA) employees work in our two production facilities. Most use massive, fast-moving equipment that can create dangerous work situations. This reality makes workplace safety especially critical within our Company.

Four accidents occur every day within UPM's operations globally. An average of 1,500 UPM employees are absent from work each day because of illness or injury. Among the Company's goals – to be achieved by 2008 – are no fatal accidents at any UPM facility, absenteeism of less than 4 percent and a 10 percent decrease in workplace accidents.

This issue of U focuses on safety within UPM North America and what we're doing to continue to improve it. We have included a story about **David Frandsen**, a former Senior Millwright at UPM Blandin Paper Mill, who was critically injured on the job in March 2001. David, his family and his doctor agreed to share their story with U in the hopes that it will remind each of us why working safely is so important. If one employee reads this article and works more safely the next day, it will be worth it.

UPM NA has much to be proud of in our steadily improving safety record. Our achievements range from individual mile-

injury to millwide accomplishments like the safety records Blandin set this year.

Safety makes good sense from a business perspective – our customers and shareholders expect UPM to operate safe and healthful workplaces.
