Tell Trader Joe's to Go All the Way

Factory farms use enormous quantities of antibiotics to help animals grow faster and endure crowded, filthy and stressful conditions. This breeds antibiotic-resistant bacteria like MRSA, one "superbug" that is estimated to kill more people annually than HIV/AIDS. Trader Joe's is almost there: it already offers one of the biggest selections of meat raised without antibiotics.



One Step Closer to Regulating Toxic Chemicals

No one wants toxic chemicals in their furniture, cleaning products, household cleaners and electronics—and definitely not in

their kids' toys. Thanks to public demand and NRDC's efforts, last week the Safe Chemicals Act moved out of committee in the Senate.

Outside the Beltway, restricting dangerous chemicals is a bi-partisan issue. A new national poll shows that 68 percent of respondents think the threat posed to people's health by exposure to toxic chemicals is serious and support stricter regulations of chemicals used and produced in the United States.

Majority of Americans want stricter chemical regulations.

Senate committee passes Safe Chemicals Act, with a partyline vote. Sign our petition by August 10, and ask Trader Joe's to go all the way and commit to selling only meat and poultry raised without antibiotics.

Storm Battered U.S. Shows the Destructive Power of Climate Change

June's powerful string of thunderstorms—called a "derecho"—left a wake of destruction from Indiana to Delaware, killing 23 people and leaving 2.5 million without power. Severe storms flooded parts of Minnesota and Wisconsin, while most of the Midwest is suffering through the worst drought in half a century. We can defuse this extreme weather by reducing the carbon pollution that causes climate change.
